Professor Snowling is interested in the nature and causes of children's reading difficulties and how best to ameliorate them. Without the ability to read fluently with comprehension there is a downward spiral of poor educational achievement and career prospects. Dyslexia is therefore a major problem for society and a key question is whether it is possible to intervene early to ameliorate its impact.
