Report from the President of the MLTAACT Inc.

Semester Two began with all state and territory MLTA presidents attending the AFMLTA Assembly in Adelaide in July 2018. All MLTA presidents and AFMLTA executives shared their reports and discussions took place about languages education and projects currently happening on a national scale. During the Assembly meeting, I was elected as the Treasurer for the AFMLTA, this is a wonderful opportunity for the ACT to be involved in the languages space at the national and international level.

Our partnership with the National Gallery of Australia, led by Myriam Davies, continued with the successful upload of Chinese and Indonesian resources onto the NGA website. A huge thank you to the members who worked so productively within a short timeframe to produce such quality teacher resources. We look forward to supporting the NGA in creating language resources for some of the exhibitions coming to Canberra in 2019 and for some of the permanent exhibits.

Annemarie Power and Prue Roveta have been working collaboratively on the New Educator Program which has matched experienced mentors with new language teachers throughout the year. We would like to expand this valuable program in 2019 so if you are aware of any new language teachers then please ask them to contact us so we are able to include them in the program.

Our Mini-Conference which was held on Saturday 18 August was TQI Accredited for four hours and provided our members with the opportunity to upskill in the areas of using Google Forms and Google Sheets as formative assessment tools, implementing games and other engaging online activities in the classroom and how to use in-flipped classroom strategies in a language learning environment.

Our Term 4 event was a presentation by Prue Roveta and Myriam Davies about their journey in implementing TCI strategies within their classrooms. They provided a beginner's guide to what has worked, what was challenging and the future direction of TCI in their individual classrooms.

This presentation by Prue and Myriam was the result of their attendance at the TCI workshops in January 2018 when the MLTAACT Inc. supported them with a scholarship to cover the cost of registration at the TCI conference.

Mandy Scott, Fuxin Li, Frank Keighley and myself attended a meeting the with ACT Minister for Multicultural Affairs in October to discuss the need for a bigger focus on languages at the ACT Multicultural Festival. This was a positive meeting and we look forward to the recognition of Canberra as a multilingual community as part of the Multicultural Festival in February 2019.

I recently represented the MLTAACT Inc. at the ACT Chief Minister's Reading Challenge Awards Ceremony and it was extremely pleasing to hear the promotion and importance of reading in another language.

The ACT Multicultural Summit was held on Friday 23 November, I was able to attend and participate in the discussions around inclusiveness, health, youth, community engagement and the future. Community languages and languages education was a common thread during many of the discussions.

The 2018 Fiona Arthur Language Teaching Award was closely contested with several high-quality nominations. The MLTAACT Committee assessed all nominations and we announced Rebecca Battaglini as this year's worthy recipient. We congratulate Rebecca and she will be officially presented with the award at the 2019 Meet and Greet on Thursday 28 February 2019.

The 2018 round of *FIPLV Congress 1988 Scholarships* has been decided with three of our members been awarded financial assistance to undertake a variety of projects such as supporting individual language proficiency development, assisting with the costs of presenting research findings at an international conference and to provide opportunities for ACT students to further their understanding of language and culture during a visit by their sister school to Canberra.

The MLTAACT Inc. was recently invited to join the discussion on languages education in ACT schools on ABC Radio. I thank Frank Keighley for taking on the role as our spokesperson and confidently advocating for languages education and for highlighting some of the current and ongoing issues around languages education in the ACT.

We are excited about the ongoing ELLA program in ACT preschool services and look forward to hearing about the rollout of the 2019 ELLA K-2 Trial in some of our ACT schools.

The MLTAACT Executive Committee have agreed to make available scholarships to its members through the subsidising of the registration costs up to the equivalent of 6 attendees at the 22Nd AFMLTA International Languages Conference in Hobart, Tasmania from 7-9 July 2019. Information about applications for the scholarship opportunity will be provided to members via email.

The call for papers for the 22nd AFMLTA International Languages Conference has been extended to Monday 4 February 2019 and early-bird registrations will be available until Monday 1 April 2019.





A not-for-profit organisation

In our June article, we mentioned briefly that the Canberra Academy of Languages is a not-for-profit organisation. However, like any not-for-profit organisation, we need to ensure that we have the revenue to carry out the activities that relate to our purpose. The purpose of the Canberra Academy of Languages is outlined in our charter, which is in Schedule 2 of our Articles of Association. The charter is available via the home page of our website. Many not-for-profits are associations that derive their revenue mainly from membership fees - a good example being MLTA. In our case, our major revenue source is enrolment fees. These enable us to cover the cost of program delivery, including teacher salaries, venue hire, public liability insurance and teaching resources.

Multilingual Poetry Workshop

One of the organisations auspiced for ACT Government funding applications is Mother Tongue Multilingual Poetry. They ran a workshop at Civic Library on Sunday 5 August exploring writing and performing poetry in languages other than English and a Multilingual Poetry Night on Monday 13 August 2018 at Smith's Alternative, in languages including Mandarin, Cebuano, Hindi, Bengali, French, German, Shona, Dari, Farsi, Japanese, Mongolian, Sinhalese, Serbian and Spanish.

Soirée littéraire

A "soirée littéraire" was held on Thursday 21 June, with author Karen Viggers reading extracts from her writings and Flavie Alvarez reading French translations. Nancy Waites launched the second edition of the magazine Canberra en français - a beautiful local publication. Three CAL French students had items included at page 13 of this edition, under the title "témoignages", alongside an item about the

Visit to the Rome City & Empire Exhibition

On Monday, November 12th, 2018, the students of Prof. Rodriguez's Year 10 Italian class took a trip to the Rome City + Empire Exhibit at the National Museum of Australia. 
