Nominations Open

The Patji-Dawes Language Teaching Award honours outstanding achievements in teaching languages other than English by an accomplished practitioner or team of practitioners in Australia.

The Patji-Dawes award is an initiative of the ARC Centre of Excellence for the Dynamics of Language through their Outreach program, which includes a commitment to improving levels of multilingualism and mastery of other

languages in Australia through understanding and public debate on how we learn (and teach) second and other languages most effectively. The award is co-sponsored by the two national language teaching bodies, the Australian Federation of Modern Language Teachers Associations and the Languages and Cultures Network for Australian Universities.

The award will include a certificate, small cash prize and, if travel permitted, airfare and accommodation for both the prize-winner and their nominator to attend the award ceremony. In 2021, this is proposed for the AFMLTA conference in Adelaide, 4-6 July 2021.

Deadline for submission of nominations: 8 March 2021. Nomination forms and more details are available here.

ACT BILINGUAL EDUCATION ALLIANCE

The ACT Bilingual Education Alliance (ACTBEA) has continued to celebrate and promote languages and language learning despite the many challenges presented by the global pandemic and restrictions on social gatherings this year.

One of the ways we have done this was through organising 'Taste of Languages', a free fun competition open to all students in the Canberra region from preschool to Year 12. There were prizes for four categories depending on Year level. The competition ran from mid-June to 1 September 2020 and invited students (with the help of parents for the Preschool to Year 2 category) to make a short video and write about a favourite meal or dish that involved another language.

We held a COVID-safe presentation ceremony for winners and shortlisted finalists at the Theo Notaras Multicultural Centre on Monday 2 November. ACTBEA is also working with ACT Libraries and selected community language schools on a pilot project to develop simple original children's story books for groups who find it difficult to access suitable books in their family languages. We are encouraging community language schools to involve older students in the writing and/or illustrating of the stories. ACT Libraries may be able to print some of the books, which will then be available for borrowing or reading during the Bilingual Story Times regularly held at various library branches.

We are hoping to continue our collaboration with ACT Libraries and build on the experience gained in this pilot project to help organise story writing workshops for a wider range of languages in the future.

Presenters for certificates of completion included principals from the colleges attended by the French and Tamil students and the languages coordinator from the German student's college. Some of the graduating students spoke briefly at the event about their language learning experience. Our graduating Spanish student was interstate and unable to attend. Laros Industries excursion

On Thursday 19 November, for their final face-to-face session in 2020, the CAL German class visited Laros Industries in Fyshwick. The company name is an anagram of the word "Solar". Laros specialises in sustainable building design, using modular solutions air-tight and thermally-broken doors and windows and air-tight breathable membranes. Their principal suppliers include firms in Germany and Austria and the owner-manager's first language is German. Discussion during the visit was almost exclusively in German. The German teacher reported that after returning to the class venue, there was a lively discussion on the insights gained during the visit. We greatly appreciate the generosity and interest of Michael Kingsland in facilitating it.

Partnerships

Plans are on hold for the languages showcase to be held as part of the 2021 National Multicultural Festival. Because of risks with COVID-19, at this stage the timing and implementation for next year's NMF are uncertain.

Meanwhile, Mother Tongue Multilingual Poetry, which has funding auspiced by CAL held its final event for 2020 on Monday evening 23 November 2020. Their program has been highly successful and has had a strong following with many regulars attending either in person or via Zoom. Recent events have offered both options, which also meant that interested people from outside the Canberra region could participate.

Staffing

As noted above, we are looking for a teacher of Japanese for next year. Meanwhile, I am pleased to advise that Anja Ward joined the CAL team for the final quarteryear with CAL German. Anja's first language is German and she has been excellent in the role.

FRENCH LANGUAGE NETWORK

Nouvelle Calédonie

At the French Network's last meeting of the year, the focus was on New Caledonia. Dr Yves Lafoy, Official representative of New Caledonia to Australia, Counsellor at the French Embassy, had organised presentations by CREIPAC Language school as well as a presentation of the curriculum by the New Caledonian Education Department (Vice Rectorate). These presentations were made virtually. Elisabeth Glasgow from the ACT Education Directorate gave a presentation of the Australian curriculum. As the cross-curriculum priorities in Australia and New Caledonia are very similar, i.e. stressing the need to promote connections between the indigenous



and non-indigenous populations to foster more meaningful collaboration, emphasising the need of students to connect with the Pacific and Asian region, and for students to engage with the environment and try to promote a sustainable development in the region and find solutions to problems encountered.

It was great seeing so many teachers interested in collaborating with schools in New Caledonia, and to have the support of the directorate to start arranging exchanges with sister-schools. We are all hoping that a travel bubble will be established with New Caledonia given that there have been a very limited number of COVID 19 cases there as well as here in the ACT. For next year, we are hoping to be able to supply lesson plans for different age-groups and organise virtual meetings of our classes. Excursion by Campbell High School Year 9 students to North Ainslie Primary —December 2020.

The Year 9 French students have written and illustrated children's books this semester, and on Thursday were welcomed to North Ainslie Primary school where Mme Patricia Hamilton's Year 4 students eagerly waited for them. Six groups were organised and the Year 4 students were rapt by the story telling in French. Anahid, Madison and Aidan had created an ABC-book telling a story about a ball lost in play, replaced by buying a new one on the web – one of the few words in French starting on the letter 'W'. Olivia told the story of 'Robert Le Requin', a shark who wanted to be friends with the other fish, where as Kirily and Ida's story was about a bullied, purple butterfly Daisy. Indi and Jenna's book beautifully illustrated told about Lou le Kangourou Bleu's adventures on top of the Eiffel tower and how he gets down with the help of a pink flamingo. News from the Network Leader

This year, the ACT German community was fortunate to have an exhibition curated at the Canberra Museum and Gallery (CMAG) that told the stories of skilled German workers 'the Jennings Germans' arriving in Canberra to support the construction of the developing city. The Canberra Gallery and Museum offered German classes across the ACT tours of this exhibition to share this cultural history with our students and enrich their learning programs. Several ACT schools took up this offer and were treated to detailed tours by the senior curator of the exhibition. The history was shared through the lens of personal stories and experiences in our local community. This exhibition received support from the German Embassy and will retain the digital resources through the CMAG website – a great resource for future years! Teachers were also upskilled in this local history at our Network Mini-Conference, where the senior curator again presented. The Network is very thankful to the support of CMAG and the senior curator for sharing this resource and history.

For the first time in several years, the German Network offered a Speaking Competition to our Year 7-11 students. This competition was supported by Das Zentrum and the Goethe Institut. Students were offered a range of texts and poetry in three levels. We had a good participation rate and the results will be announced in late November. We are thankful for the support of the language organisations to run this opportunity for our students.

After some delays due to COVID restrictions, we held our German Mini-Conference on Saturday, 7 November. We held this at CMAG to allowed us to link in with the Jennings Germans exhibition. This conference was officially opened by a representative of the German Embassy and included sessions from the Goethe Institut, a very interesting presentation by the curator of the Jennings Germans exhibition and teacher sharing. It was great to come together after a long year!

Throughout this school year the Goethe Institut has offered several online professional development programs which teachers embraced.

We hope to have more events up and running again next year. It has been a challenging year, but also a year of opportunities for growth and adaptation.

Orangutan Sponsorship

The five orangutans are being cared for at the Orangutan Foundation International rehabilitation centre in Kalimantan, so that they can one day return to living in the wild.

Every year students from Indonesian classes bake cupcakes to sell to the school community – so that they can raise funds to continue sponsoring the "Melrose Orangutans". The project was the suggestion of current Year 10 students, when they studied about palm oil and orangutans in Year 7 Indonesian classes. We receive updates every six months on the orangutans' progress and can connect with them via photos and videos.

This year students raised a staggering \$618! This means that we can continue sponsoring our five orangutans for the next 12 months. With the extra money raised this year, we have been able to commit to sponsoring Jeffrey Junior (the youngest) for the next two years. It is so lovely for students to be able to connect their class-room learning with programs that have an impact out in the wider community.

"Italian studies at St. Francis Xavier College, Canberra"

These are the words of Sidney Shaw, a Year 10 student at St Francis Xavier College (SFX) in Canberra.

"I appreciate this program because we have the opportunity to learn Italian in a fun way and it allows us to make new friends, learn new concepts with language and culture, and even take a trip to Italy with the school," she continued.

"It helps us to gain knowledge of how other countries work, as well as the languages; not only do we get to learn a new language, but it improves our problem solving, memory and communication skills."

Italian is one of the two languages offered, as well as Japanese, to the 1200 students at the Catholic high school in the Australian capital.

Classes are presented in a dynamic and stimulating way, providing opportunities to explore the Italian language and culture beyond a textbook.

Languages are compulsory for the first two years (there are currently six Italian classes in both Year 7 and Year 8) but they become optional in the following years, leading to a significant drop in numbers.

The only exception was in 2019, a year that saw record numbers with two Year 9 Italian classes for the first time ever.

Tina Rodriguez teaches Italian at SFX, together with her colleague Silvana Olsen.

Rodriguez has worked at the school since 2008, straight after getting her teaching qualification as a mature-age student once her children were grown up.

"I wouldn't want to be teaching anything other than Italian; it's a great passion of mine and I'm proud of my heritage," she said, adding that both of her parents migrated to Australia from Calabria in the 1950s.

Rodriguez is an advocate of the school's cultural exchange program with the Liceo "Girolamo Bagatta", a state upper secondary school located in the municipality of Desenzano del Garda in the province of Brescia, and she made it her personal mission to breathe life into the project.

When she first started teaching at SFX, she applied for a scholarship in Italy and through that, she met the principal of the school in Lombardy.

Since 2013, a strong link between the two schools has been consolidated: Italian students have visited Canberra twice, and SFX students have been to Desenzano four times.

Studying Italian in Year 9 is a requirement to participate in the trip, and the exchange program is a big incentive for students to continue their language studies throughout high school.

"Learning Italian has given me an insight into the culture as well as the language skills to participate in the Italian trip our school offers," Year 10 student, Indyanna Marshall, said.

"The three weeks I spent in Italy on our school trip were some of the best weeks of my whole life.

"I was able to experience a whole new culture and learn about Italy's history by visiting famous landmarks such as the Leaning Tower of Pisa and Pompeii.

"Because I had been able to learn the language, I was able to spend my time with a host family, experience how they lived, meet new people, and test my skills."

Due to the coronavirus pandemic, SFX students were unable to host their Italian counterparts this year, while the trip to Italy that was scheduled for 2021 has also been cancelled.

Fortunately, the school year is filled with special classes and excursions that keep students engaged.

For both Japanese and Italian, the work units tend to end with more interactive activities.

Year 8 students participate in a cooking class, while Year 9 students explore the theme of Italian fashion and the concept of "la bella figura" by participating in a fashion parade and describing the outfits of their classmates in Italian.

Older students learn about more challenging topics such as the environment, with trips to nature parks in the area.

Last week, a group of senior students had the opportunity to interview some representatives of the Italian Embassy in Canberra and explore the theme of identity in Italy.

"This term's work unit is titled 'Society and Communities' and focuses on regions and regionalism," Rodriguez said.

"Through a series of questions they prepare, the students must understand how strong regional identity still is in Italy today.

"The point is to see whether people in Italy still say 'I'm Calabrian' before they say 'I'm Italian'.

"If they don't have Italian background, students don't fully understand this regional attachment at first."

In the coming weeks, students will also participate in a national language competition that will test their knowledge, and the winners will be announced during a school event at the end of the year.

For those who are already thinking about university, excellent news (and a further incentive) comes from the Australian National University, which adds an additional five points on to the ATAR score of students who study Italian in their final years.

In short, there really is no excuse to not learn Italian at SFX!
